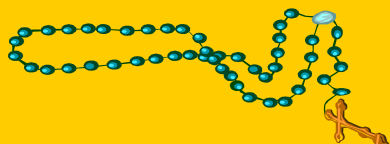

Off to Summer Camp

Summer camp is fast approaching and this year the Troop is going to Napowan Adventure Base near Wild Rose, Wisconsin in the middle of July. Besides spending a week in a tent and feeding countless mosquitoes, we will have plenty of opportunities to enjoy the many features of the camp.

The 2011 Season will mark the 66th Consecutive Summer Camp Program run on the grounds of beautiful Camp Napowan. Each year approximately 100 dedicated individuals serve as camp staff and volunteers to bring the outdoor aspects of the troop scouting program to over 2,000 campers and leaders. The camp has two lakes within its boundaries, Hills Lake and Napowan Lake which will offer many water sport merit badge opportunities.



For most in Troop 127, this will be our first Napowan experience including yours truly. The Troop did go there several years ago but most of the scouts have earned their Eagle Scout and moved onto college. It should be an interesting experience in light of some of the special features of Napowan.

They have a program, CAP (Camper Activity Program), to help first year scouts complete many of the requirements for Tenderfoot, Second and First Class. Call it a jumpstart on their rank advancements. Troop 127 strongly encourages this program along with the Swimming (Eagle required), Basketball and Leatherworks merit badges.

The Flintlock Living History Village is what sets the Napowan Adventure Base apart from all other Boy Scout summer camps. Visiting Flintlock is like taking a step back in time. The blacksmith shop, which has a fully functional forge, and the old time printing press are enough to make the area special. However,

the authentic log cabins and Native American lodges also add to the special magic that make most Scouts return to describe it to their friends.

The camp offers over 50 merit badge opportunities and the Troop normally does very well in the number of badges earned. We have 21 scouts attending this year and at least 8 scouters. We expect big adventure, lots of merit badges and even more wonderful memories of time spent at summer camp.

Not to be outdone, the Pack also has several day camp opportunities going on for Wolves, Bears and Webelos throughout the summer as well. It will be a very busy time for all of them.

We will have a post camp wrap up once the Troop returns and counts up how we did. In the meantime, enjoy your summer and thank you to Father McCormick Council 3880 for your continued support of Cub Scout Pack 127 and Boy Scout Troop 127.

Pro-Life Report

We do know Jack: What is assisted suicide really about?

June 20, 2011 (Breakpoint.org) - Dr. Jack Kevorkian, a.k.a., "Dr. Death," died earlier this month in a hospital in Royal Oaks, Michigan. He was eighty-three.

The location of his death is worth noting, because while he died in a hospital, many of the 130 people he helped kill themselves took their lives in or near his VW bus.



He was the subject of HBO film starring Al Pacino called "You Don't Know Jack" which, as the title suggests, portrayed him as a misunderstood figure. In his Emmy-Award acceptance speech, Pacino called Kevorkian "brilliant and interesting and unique."

Like the HBO biopic, the New York Times obituary went to great lengths to portray Kevorkian in a positive light. In an almost comical attempt at "balance," the Times said that both his critics and supporters generally "agreed" that his "advocacy of assisted suicide helped spur the growth of hospice care in the United States."

That's like saying that John Dillinger helped spur the growth of bank security. As Times columnist Ross Douthat noted in his excellent column, one study found that 60 percent of Kevorkian's "patients" weren't terminally ill. In fact, autopsies revealed that some of them weren't sick at all!

So what was Dr. Death up to? Ultimately, "physician-assisted suicide" isn't about compassionate care of the sick and dying, it's about personal autonomy. As Douthat wrote, the case for it "depends much more on our respect for people's own desire to die than on our sympathy for

their devastating medical conditions."

Ludwig Minelli, who founded Dignitas, a Swiss organization that facilitates suicides, calls the ability to determine the time and manner of one's death "a marvelous possibility given to a human being" - a "possibility" that shouldn't be confined to the terminally ill. Thus, one study found that 21 percent of the approximately 1,000 people Dignitas has helped commit suicide were not terminally ill.

As a devout Christian, Douthat takes solace in the fact that fourteen years ago, in *Compassion in Dying v. Glucksberg*, the Supreme Court rejected the idea of a constitutional "right to die."

I'm not so consoled. The Court didn't decide the case on its merits, only that people had not yet settled the question in democratic debate. But any time it wants to the Court can raise the question again and base their decision on Justice Kennedy's infamous ruling in *Planned Parenthood v. Casey*: "At the heart of liberty," Kennedy wrote, "is the right to define one's own concept of existence, of meaning, of the universe, and of the

mystery of human life." That passage is, as once critic put it, a "thing of almost infinite plasticity" that could justify almost anything. And the Court often does change its mind. When *Casey* was decided in 1992, for example, no one thought Kennedy's passage would create a constitutional right to sodomy, but it did. Seventeen years after ruling there was no such right, the court reversed itself in *Lawrence v. Texas*.

People who think that it can't happen with physician-assisted suicide, especially as public opinion shifts on the issue, not only don't know Jack, they don't know what the courts are capable of. We who believe in the sanctity of human life from conception through natural death must speak out in every public forum. Otherwise we will have thrust upon us the constitutional right to die.
